
PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE




Brownie troop #688 and #235 have been invested. The girls are all busy working on projects and learning all about Brownie Girl Scouting.

THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION --According to George Jackson



The topic for the P.T.A. meeting of February 6th will be a film—one that was produced at the George Jackson Studios by Mr. Engel and his fifth grade core classes.

One of the editational devices we employed last year was to recreate, dramatize and re-enact scenes, and times and places from the Social Studies curriculum. Specifically, scenes from

the Revolutionary War period; instead of on the stage -on 8mm. color film:

Our film project, rather than being considered primarily as a film, should be viewed as the utilization and correlation of the combined resources of our school; its grounds, its students and its personnel.

We are grateful to a multitude of people: the little first graders who loaned us their toy soldiers, guns and models; the talented music teachers who provided us with musical backround for the sound track; the creative arts teacher and her students who constucted three-dimensional miniature battlefields; the parents who sent in materials and generously gave their time and effort in helping us sew the uniforms for the Continental and Redcoat soldiers.

Armed with this arsenal of community-school resources, our fifth graders proceeded to write scripts, record sound effects, stage scenery, animate maps and models, and act out their roles before the camera.

The film begins by depicting the situation of the American colonies in relation to Great Britain in the middle of the 18th century. Their dissatisfaction with the tyranny of King George grows more and more intense; protests over "Taxation Without Representation coupled with other aggravating incidents catapult the thirteen colonies into a full scale war with their mother country.

Included among the scenes are the battles of Lexington, Concord, Bunker Hill and Saratoga; Washington's hard-ships at Valley Forge and Paul Revere's ride. Finally, after a blazing duel at Yorktown, Virginia, the British General, Lord Cornwallis, is subdued and the war is over.

Thanks to many talents and skills of our special teachers, the creativity of our youngsters, and the cooperation of our wonderful parents, our movie was made possible.
